


In order to thoroughly research and educate yourself about any topic, you must read about the subject in a variety of different academic and scholarly sources. Do not "just Google it" and select whatever sites pop up at the top of the list.

If you want to perform a web search, I recommend the search engine <u>RefSeek</u> (www.refseek.com), which is designed for students and produces more academic search results. Additionally, you should supplement your research by using all available databases, e-books and print resources.

Doing research is like going on an information treasure hunt. Follow the clues by clicking on links that may lead to further information. Also, check the references included at the end of articles or books to find additional resources.



# Citing Images



You must provide a citation for any images you use in slideshows or other presentations. When you are looking for images, it is best to use sites that offer creative commons licensed images in order to avoid infringing on copyright laws. Some helpful sites include:

## MLA Documentation Style



We use the MLA (Modern Language Association) documentation style at SJP. In a handbook the scholars at the MLA spell out certain formatting and citation rules you must follow on all research projects.

Purdue University's <u>Online Writing Lab</u> website is a great resource to use when creating your Works Cited page and formatting your research paper.
